




### A reflection to pray on:

**Registration for Faith Formation in Grades 1-6 is officially closed.** Only new students will be accepted. One form per child needed.

**Faith Formation for Pre-K and Kindergarten are optional** and do not begin until the end of October. **Grade Nine** will receive a special invitation to begin their Confirmation journey, if they so choose, in October.

**The Sacraments of Reconciliation and First Eucharist are significant markers in a child's life.** These special moments are also times of family renewal as to the meaning of each sacrament. It takes time and effort on a collaborative basis to develop a clear understanding of the meaning and lifelong impact of each sacrament. This collaborative effort includes parents who are the primary educators in the Faith, the Pastor, the Director of Faith Formation and the Catechist Team. Therefore, there has been a change in the Sacramental Preparation for Reconciliation and First Communion beginning this year. Reconciliation will be received in Gr. 2 in 2015 during the Holy Season of Lent. First Communion will be received in Grade 3 in the Spring of 2016. The national theme for our catechetical year is "Teaching about God's Gift of Forgiveness". This is an appropriate time to begin this new approach to a child's sacramental life and a wonderful opportunity to re-catechize parents as to the beauty and value of the Sacramental life of our Catholic Church.

A Weekly Bible Study  
23<sup>rd</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time  
All Readings



We do not journey in life alone. As children of our heavenly Father, we are bound to one another in faith, hope and love. Each of today's readings illustrates one of these "theological virtues" in a unique way as they are lived out in our relationships with others.

We turn first to today's Gospel which reaffirms our bonds of *faith*. Jesus assures us that it is in the context of community that our prayers will be heard. This does not diminish the value of personal prayer, but adds another dimension. In the joining of hearts and minds in faith we are the Body of Christ where Jesus makes himself fully present. We have only to look around our congregation this day, joined in common prayer, to witness this unity.

*Hope* was all the priest-prophet Ezekiel could offer to the suffering, exiled people of 6<sup>th</sup> century Judah. Jerusalem, the heart and soul of their life and faith, was now destroyed and they were scattered. Ezekiel would be responsible for bringing them back to God. And they would make this journey together, united in mind and heart, supporting one another as they returned to their spiritual and physical homeland. Their shared sense of hope would guide them to a better place.

As Paul affirms in his letters, the greatest of this triumvirate is *love*. It seems simple enough in today's excerpt from Romans: "Owe nothing to anyone except to love one another."

If only we could divest ourselves of the baggage that distorts our ability to love fully. The great commandment is the ideal to which we must always aspire and the ten commandments provide us with practical guidelines. Surely we will fail miserably and often. But supported by our faith community and encouraged by its hopefulness, love will grow and reveal its fruits in our relationships with those who surround us, inspire us, encourage us, lift us and carry us along the way.

### Our Liturgy Ministers

We are blessed to have many individuals who participate in the celebration of the Eucharist: Altar Servers, Lectors, Eucharistic Ministers, Choirs, Flower Ministers, Ushers & Greeters. Each brings their special gift to our liturgies as they offer their work as a prayer to our Living God. In their respective ministry, they reflect on a Mass well served, on the Word eloquently proclaimed, on the Holy Eucharist distributed with care & devotion, on song delivered as praying twice, on floral environment designed to enhance the Eucharistic Celebration, on serving the congregation by collecting our offerings, on providing a welcoming presence to all. The actions of all of our ministers together with the celebrant, raise our hearts & mind to God. **It is within this spiritual framework that we respectfully ask you to refrain from applause after Communion** \*for those who are engaged in ministry so that their prayerful reflection and yours may be directed without interruption to our Loving God. \*Ref. The General Instruction of the Roman Missal, sect. 43: one "may sit or kneel while the period of sacred silence after Communion is observed."

## SPEAKING OUT IN LOVE

In the final verses of today's Gospel reading Jesus says that when two or three are gathered in his name, "there am I in the midst of them" (Matthew 18:20). So we understand that fraternal correction is always undertaken in the presence of Jesus Christ.

Likewise, encouraging the good in others is not only the right thing for us to do, it is a necessity. The LORD tells the prophet Ezekiel that if he does not speak out to dissuade a person from evil, then he too will be held responsible.

We live in a "do your own thing" age where moral objectivity is often ignored. Clearly when the message we share with others is rooted in love, our motives cannot ever be misinterpreted. As Saint Paul writes, "Love does no evil to the neighbor; hence, love is the fulfillment of the law" (Romans 13:10).

## TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

We know for certain that the sacrament of penance was a fairly rare event in the life of a Christian in the early centuries, but that everyone had a duty to admit their sins and ask forgiveness before giving thanks in the Sunday Eucharist and receiving Christ's Body and Blood at the table. Everyone today is familiar with this same ancient pattern. We also know about Lent and its journey of renewal, and even those who are returning from summer vacations may speak of a fresh perspective on life and a resolve to do better. Saint Augustine spoke of a third kind of penance, beyond the turning of the catechumens to a different life, beyond the normal everyday fresh starts, to a form that is severe and serious. Certain sins broke faith with the community: the sinners were obliged to give their names to the bishop and were barred from participation in the Eucharist. Augustine mentioned sacrilege, adultery, and murder as the culprits, great wounds for the perpetrator, wounds that were serious, deadly, mortal. Penance was such a frightening prospect that many people delayed their baptism for fear that they would sin, a practice with which Augustine was well acquainted. Pastoral need would eventually call the church to reconsider its practice.

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### Proper Attire

The Liturgy Committee has been receiving requests for guidelines on the proper attire in church. The following is an excerpt from an article entitled: Celebration of Mass - Proper Church Attire. We offer this to you for serious consideration. The summer season usually sees an increasing number of people who come to church to attend Mass or other liturgical functions dressed in a way that disrespects the sanctity of the House of God and the sacredness of the Liturgical Celebration.

This is a difficult topic. We do not want to suggest that one is not welcome at a Sunday liturgy without expensive clothing—and yet, out of respect for what we are doing at Mass and as an example for young children, a modicum of propriety is expected.

The goal in dressing for Mass should be not to attract undue attention to oneself. It must be considered that some people, out of necessity, come to Mass wearing the clothes required by their profession, however, under normal circumstances attire should reflect the solemnity of the Mass. One should aim for, “you look nice today,” as opposed to, “my gosh! Did you see what she or he was wearing today?”

Men are advised not to wear hats, tank tops or jersey shorts during Mass. Women are also asked not to wear spaghetti-strap tops, short skirts or skimpy shorts. Simply put—beach wear, lounge wear, exercise wear, etc. are not appropriate attire.

The manner in which the minister dresses is part of the reverence that is shown to the Lord present in the Eucharist, as well as respect shown for God’s holy people.
